## Official Minutes of the Rowlett Arts and Humanities Commission Special Work Session

## 1) Meeting called to order by Chair Mary Drayer at 6:36 p.m. and a quorum was present.

- Members present: Hugo Martinez, Mary Drayer, Jerry Barshop, Laqueata Brown, and Cassie Wilson.
- Members absent: Veena Valiaveedu and Jerry Hickman.
- City Staff present: Drew Rist, Kathy Freiheit and Brenda Kennedy.
- Visitors present:

## 2) Discussion only. Community interest, conceptual uses and other ideas for a City Cultural Arts Center.

- Question: Who currently rents performance centers outside the City of Rowlett?
  - --Discussion followed with Lakeshore Symphonic Winds and Rowlett Community Chorale stating their groups rent outside the City, but would rent a Cultural Arts Center if built in Rowlett.
- Question: Would groups rent or lease a facility in Rowlett?
  - --Discussion followed with Hugo Martinez stating the Lakeshore Symphonic Winds would spend money to rent a performance center in Rowlett, if it's a quality center with appropriate acoustics for musical concerts.
  - --Mary Drayer commented that the dance companies were not represented at meeting, but currently the groups rent facilities out of Rowlett for performances.
  - --Other comments on how a center could be used included corporate meetings, theater groups, weddings, and social events.
- Question: How would a Cultural Arts Center be funded? Maintained?
  - --Discussion followed with a suggestion that it might be included in a development, or perhaps a large company included at the beginning could be joined by others in such a venture.
  - --Other suggestions included a bond election (where a center would generate revenue for the City), charging for naming rights, or starting a non-profit organization.
  - --Question asked if any government grants were available; no one was aware of any.
  - --Discussed ensued on how a center might not sustain itself for the first few years of operation.
  - -- Hugo Martinez suggested the cost for a center might be between \$36 to \$38 million.
  - --Clarification was asked on the purpose of the meeting, with response that it was to gather information on citizen interest and conceptual uses for such a facility.

 Final discussion acknowledged the need for City Council action for any proposed Cultural Arts Center and bond election, and questioned the impact of a center on the City's budget.
